A couple of years ago, a friend asked that we all think of a word that could be a word we would remember for the coming year and to think back on how that word affected us. I really don't remember which word I chose, but if she asked for next year, I would choose the word gratitude. And not gratitude for things that have been done for me, but for some of the wonderful things that have happened around me most recently.

The Blessing Box continues to be a source of food for many of the families in our church neighborhood and beyond. I know that I do not see half of the people who stop, nor do I see the many people who add food items to our box. For the past many years, the Pre-School here at St. John's ask their families to donate to that box for Thanksgiving time. A list is sent home with each child of the items needed, and

soon after, the donations begin showing up in the "food room". This year, as I write this article, the food is still coming in for the box.

There are so many times, the amount of money that I have to buy groceries gets really low, and I wonder where the money needed will come from. And you know, it always comes in. The Pre-school has helped so much this year. I am so very grateful.

I spent some time one Saturday in November helping to register people for Share-A-Christmas. We, the ONE Group Heather and I belong to, were set up in front of the Flea Market. The Spanish speaking members of our group had their computers and connected with T4C to register the mostly Latinos who wanted to sign up. Heather and I handed out numbers and directed "traffic".

The ONE group is made up of people in our area that speak Spanish. Many of them have lived in Mexico or somewhere in Central America. These people care very deeply for our neighbors from Guatemala and elsewhere and help them navigate through paperwork. They volunteer their time and energies to help others.

I listen to their stories of what happens to our Latina neighbors on the way here and then when they arrive here. I was born and raised here in

Dover. My parents helped me navigate the ways of life as their parents did for them. The Latino parents have no idea how to do all this. The One Group helps them. I am so grateful to know these people and to be able to help them help others.

A terrible fire occurred last week at a warehouse in Carroll County. Over 900 toys were destroyed. The warehouse belonged to a man who had collected those toys for *Toys for Tots*.

Yesterday after church, I headed to Tuscora Park to help in the collection of toys for *Toys for Tots* spearheaded by my nephew, Chad Simpson, of Simpson Heating and Cooling. Simpsons had planned to collect toys for *Toys for Tots* long before the fire. Yesterday was in response to the fire. People started showing up at the park at noon, and the last cars came in at 3:00. The New Philadelphia High School varsity and JV basketball players and coaches were there to help. Staff members and their spouses were there to help. Friends and relatives were there to help. Children were there to help. And help they did, with the generosity of hundreds of people who filled their cars with toys.

I was amazed at the double line of traffic coming through Storybook Lane. People came from North Canton and Harrison County. A big box truck showed up from Pennsylvania. Lawn and landscaping trailers were filled almost as soon as

they showed up. The toys are all in a warehouse being sorted and individually wrapped by more volunteers.

I am so very grateful for the communities we live in. Tears were shed many times yesterday as we were overwhelmed by the amounts of love shown.

These are three examples of greatness and compassion and love and concern that have surrounded me as I observed and helped. Gratitude is defined as “the quality of being thankful; readiness to show appreciation for and to return kindness.” I think that many of us who have helped in these three events have been greatly blessed and are very thankful. We have much to be grateful for. There has been no better feeling than to show that gratitude with our actions.

Yep, gratitude will be my word next year. I will certainly try my hardest to show gratitude in my actions and to return kindness.

## St. John's UCC Church Council Meeting December 14, 2021 at 7:30pm Hybrid Meeting (In person and Zoom)

The meeting of St. John's United Church of Christ Church Council was called to order on December 14th, 2021 at 7:37pm by President Dan Dummermuth. There were 12 members in attendance including Senior Minister, Reverend Jeffery Jackson and Pastor Dotty Hartzell.

Reverend Jeff offered an opening prayer and President Dan lit the Christ candle.

The minutes of the November 2021 meeting as emailed to council members, were approved.

Dave Gingrich gave the treasurer's report. General Fund Income for November was \$18,124 and Expenses were \$25,822 resulting in a shortfall of \$7,697 for the month. General Fund Income year-to-date is \$259,887 with Expenses year-to-date of \$338,537 resulting in a year-to-date shortfall of \$78,649. In addition to General Fund Expenses, \$42,658 has been disbursed for the floor tile repair project, \$13,500 for scholarship awards, \$22,666 for roof repairs, \$12,960 for brickwork repairs and weather-sealing, \$267,123 for Annex renovation expenses and \$13,969 for Annex furnishings. We have received total of \$125,025 on 2020 and 2021 from the PPP Federal Stimulus Program for continuation of payroll expenses. The 2020 portion of the loan was officially forgiven during August 2021. \$280,000 was transferred from investments to cover anticipated expenses. M/S/C by Adam Herman and Sue Ferbrach to approve the treasurer's report.

- 2)Advent Study/Reflection Plans,
- 3)Christmas Eve services/it has been decided all services will be held in the sanctuary,
- 4)Blue Christmas/Longest Night service will be held in Fourth and Faith and the Contemporary Worship Group are working on the details,
- 5)Open and Affirming/an exploratory task force will be formed early next year,
- 6)Gatherings and Covid/our county remains at High Risk Level and Rev. Jeff is thankful for congregational cooperation that allows us to avoid mandated quarantine orders,
- 7)Introductory Meetings and Appreciative Inquiry has help develop a good basis of understanding to assist the Transition Team and congregation in moving the church forward
- 8)Contemporary Worship Service/ Rev. Jeff suggested the hiring of Ryan Lind as a consultant who has experience in new church starts. He would advise and help reach potential new participants and implement periodic gatherings (2-3 per month). M/S/C by Belinda Lentz and Vicki Rufener to hire Ryan Lind for three months at \$1,000 per month working 15-20 hours per week. Rev. Jeff will make the offer to Ryan.

### **PASTOR OF VISITATION REPORT**

- Pastor Dotty reported the first day of the sock and underwear project was very successful as all hung on the clothes line were taken within a few hours. There are two upcoming funerals. The day trip to P. Graham Dunn facility in Dalton and lunch was enjoyed by 11 church members. The group suggested more day trips in the future. Several church groups are taking a break until after the New Year. Everyone is gearing up for Christmas activities.

**DIRECTOR OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**-Belinda Lentz reported that she, Heather Smith and six youth enjoyed a lock-in. The Christmas Greens sale project went well. The

Zoo Kids made Christmas crafts that were delivered to nursing homes. There was a good group that participated in the Advent Fest and enjoyed the yummy food and fellowship. The Live Nativity is this upcoming weekend.

### **BOARD REPORTS**

**ELDERS REPORT**- Vicki Rufener reviewed the Christmas service schedule is the following: December 21<sup>st</sup>- The Longest Night, Blue Christmas service will be for those who are grieving/loss of loved ones. This will be a celebration of Christmas for those who will find it challenging getting through the holidays. This service will be held at Fourth and Faith. December 24<sup>th</sup>- (**Please note the change**) All Christmas Eve services will be in the sanctuary. Services are 3pm, 5pm (Family and Children's Christmas celebration, "Birds of Bethlehem") and 8pm with the same liturgy the 3pm service with different music.

Installation of the new Council members will be in February.

**DEACONS REPORT**- Beth Showers reported the Deacons have confirmed ushers for December and are working on securing those for January.

**TRUSTEES REPORT** – There may be a little more tile work that will need to be done in the future.

**BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**- There will be one member of this group who will serve on the Transition Team. The Board will be providing snacks for the kids participating in the Live Nativity.

### **COMMITTEE/TASK FORCE REPORTS**

**Transition Team**- President Dan announced the Transition Team. M/S/C by Beth Showers and Belinda Lentz to approve the following members: Dan Dummermuth, Dave Gingrich, Michele Specht, Sue Ferbrach, Jean Paddock, Doug Peterman, Dotty Hartzell, Carol McCutch-

eon, Bev Smith, Adam Herman with one or two more members to be added.

**Nominating Committee**- President Dan reviewed a partial Council ballot with a few additional nominees to be added. M/S/C by Sue Ferbrach and Sally McCombs to approve the partial ballot.

**CONGREGATIONAL SOLICITATIONS**- The youth are planning a Walnut Creek Cheese cinnamon roll fundraiser with orders to be taken from January 9<sup>th</sup> through February 6<sup>th</sup>. Proceeds from the sale will go to supply the Blessing Box.

### **OLD BUSINESS**

**Fourth and Faith Building Renovation**- Dave Gingrich gave a construction update. The construction and renovation is essentially complete. We are currently waiting for the Certificate of Occupancy. 100 chairs were delivered and are stored in a back room until we are ready to arrange them in the renovated portion of the building. We have received \$7,500 to date for sponsoring tables and chairs. A sample table and bistro chair are on display for review and input. Stage sections for the Contemporary Worship area have been ordered and should be delivered soon. The cost of the stage has been sponsored 100% by a St. John's member. The audio/visual media has been selected and work should be started later this month. We have received \$3000 in sponsorship to date for AV Media. Natalie Peterman is coordinating the artwork for Fourth and Faith signage and logo. The Trustees will be establishing rates for use of the facility for outside groups. The rear unfurnished portion of the building has been cleared out and is currently being used for storage for large items. It is not to be used as a catch all for items of no use.

**NEW BUSINESS**- none

**ADJOURNMENT AND LORD'S PRAYER**- President Dan led the Council in the Lord's Prayer and the meeting was adjourned at 8:36pm.

### **The Patricia Kropf Miller and Earl David Miller Scholarship Fund**

The Millers are both life-long members of the United Church of Christ, active in seven congregations of the denomination. Pat began her professional work in the church as the Associate for Communication and Resource Development for the UCC Coordinating Center for Women. Following that she served as the Executive Associate to the Conference Minister of the Ohio Conference. For ten years she served as president of the Hope Homes Board of Directors with ministries in Ohio for adults with developmental disabilities, and as a board member of the Blanchard Means Foundation, a related ministry in Massachusetts. Pat also served for eleven years as a member of the Board of Trustees of Eden Seminary and as co-chair of the successful 2006 financial campaign for the seminary.

Following graduations from Eden Seminary, Earl was a local church pastor in Ohio for four years. He served as an interim pastor for five Pennsylvania churches while in graduate school and then joined the staff of the Stewardship Council of the UCC. Following that, he became the minister for stewardship and evangelism of the Ohio Conference. He then joined the stewardship ministry again as the Executive Director of the Stewardship Council. Earl also served on the Hope Homes Board of Directors as well as the Brooklawn Board of Directors, serving youth in Louisville, Ky. Pat has demonstrated a deep passion for the vital role of women in church and society, with a special emphasis on justice issues. Earl's passion has focused on generosity and inclusion throughout the church. Both have been heavily engaged in resource production for the whole UCC.

On a more personal note, as I began my education at Eden Seminary, St. John's and the Southeast Ohio Synod together gave me a full scholarship to cover the cost of my education. My wife Pat and I have been grateful ever since and are now happy to share this exciting news with congregations that we have been part of over the course of the last eighty years.

Recently, they are growing a vital passion for hope in these times. In their retirement, Pat and Earl continue to volunteer, serving the local church in a variety of ways. They have gifted their family and many others whom they have touched throughout their lives with a deep appreciation for a faith in God, with profound appreciation for the values of the progressive church and for God's continuing creative work in the world. It is in recognition of their passion for the church, and with deep appreciation and love, that this scholarship has been established in their names. *The Patricia Kropf Miller and Earl David Miller Scholarship Fund* shall serve others as they faithfully prepare for their own ministries of hope for the world, hope for all people and conditions, hope for the church and for themselves.

The Administration of Eden Seminary shall award scholarship(s) to United Church of Christ student (s), with preference given to a student(s) identifying as LGBTQIA+. Award: 2 recipient(s) will be selected by the Scholarship Committee of the seminary in accordance with scholarship policies of the Seminary. Principal donors, the Millers and their designees shall be notified of the scholarship recipient(s) each year and the award recipients shall be informed of the source of the scholarship. Gifts to this scholarship fund are to be invested as an integral part of the Eden Seminary endowment, under the direction and policies of the Finance Committee of the Eden Board of Directors. Income from the investments shall be awarded annually to student(s) of Eden Seminary, in accordance with the total return policy of the Seminary.



## Elder of the Month



## The Bob Baker Story Continues

Just a few updates to our story last month about our World War II veteran, Bob Baker. Bob was actually drafted into the Army and was assigned to the 97<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division. Bob was awarded the Combat Infantry Badge with Bronze Star for his actions in Central Europe. He also served Occupation Duty in Japan before he was discharged in 1946. Bob, his wife, and two children began attending St. John's church where he served as Elder, Treasurer, and President of the church council. About 25 years after the war, Bob joined the Coast Guard Auxiliary where he used his skills to do rescue work and teach boat safety.

Our thanks to Sue Dummermuth for bringing to our attention this patriot in our midst. And of course, our endless thanks to Bob Baker for his service and for doing his part to secure our freedom.


