



“Habits: What Has Always Been Done Before”

Pastor's Desk



For the past couple months, I have been doing this new thing before I write a sermon. I will go take a walk around my neighborhood. I have discovered that taking a stroll down the street is far more productive than staring at a blank Word document. Many times, when my mind relaxes enough, some kind of sermon nugget will pop into my head that I can take back to my writer's desk. During one of my pre-sermon walks, I had this epiphany, "What we do matters. Our actions matter." And here is why: **Our actions**

become our patterns. Our patterns become our habits. Our habits become our rituals. And, our rituals become our tradition.

Mark 7 reminds us that "we, humans, are creatures of habit." For the Pharisees and Jews, they had their own traditions and routines, regarding hygiene and food preparation. The Pharisees pointed out to Jesus that some of his disciples were not washing their hands before they ate and following the traditions set by the elders. Jesus pushed back on the Pharisee's comment. He raised the notion that it is not the dirt under a person's finger nails that make them unholy, but the evil inside one's heart.

I often like to encourage the church. Let's try something new. Let's try something "that has not been done before." Even though, I often give that challenge. I definitely sympathize to the fact, that we are all creatures of habit. I even like to take the same path when I take my pre-sermon stroll. I realize that our habits can bring us comfort and a sense of stability. For the past couple months, I have tried to incorporate better habits into my life. I have made a point to exercise more often, to eat less processed foods, and more "whole foods." While those healthy habits may seem commendable, I have to be honest with you. In the beginning, trying something new is hard and stressful. Trying something new feels awkward, like I am going completely against the grain of what I would naturally want to do. No matter how beneficial or good something may be, trying something new is hard, in the beginning. But, after I had done something a couple of times, it became a pattern in my week and a new habit that I have. After a while, my new habit has become my new normal.

Jesus questioned the traditions of his day. He determined that the Pharisees' pre-meal purifying ritual had become obsolete, and it was not beneficial. No matter how much they took the dirt off their hands, it did not make them anymore holy because their hearts were full of evil. The people held on to human traditions, so much so, that they lost their perspective

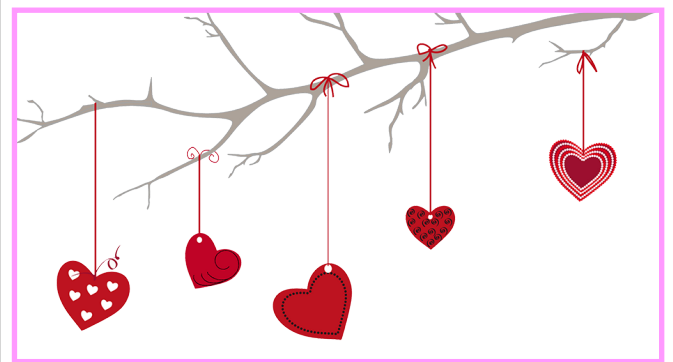


Dear St. John's UCC,

St. John's UCC Church Council Meeting January 9, 2024 at 7:30 pm

The meeting of St. John's United Church of Christ Church Council was called to order on January 9th, 2023 at 7:30 pm by Vice President Dave Gingrich. There were 15 Council members in attendance including Rev. Granados, Pastor Dotty and guest Sue Ferbrache. Rev. Cassandra lit the Christ candle and offered an opening prayer.

The December 2023 minutes were approved as submitted.

Treasurer Adam Herman reviewed the financial report. General Fund income for December 2023 was \$58,019. Expenses were \$31,095, resulting in a net gain of \$26,924 for the month. General Fund income year to date is \$332,115 and Expenses year to date is \$368,995 resulting in a shortfall year to date of \$36,881. We have transferred \$62,773 from investments in 2023 to cover General Expenses. We have disbursed \$20,741 from the Capital Improvement Fund for repairs in the church building. M/S/C by Rob Gump and Holly Gonter to approve the Treasurer's Report.

SENIOR MINISTER REPORT -

Rev. Cassandra reported the Advent Sunday services and Christmas Eve Candlelight service were successful. Scout Sunday will be February 11th.

Plans for **Ash Wednesday on February 14th** will be: Ashes-to-Go" at the corner of Fourth and Faith from 7am to 10am. It will involve coffee, donuts and ashes. All are welcome. Ash Wednesday service at 7pm in the sanctuary.

Some new and exciting events will be:

March 3rd will be a Brunch Church in the downstairs Social

Hall.

March 24th will be Palm Passion Sunday. This service will incorporate Maundy Thursday and Good Friday into a Palm Passion Sunday Service. **There will be no Maundy Thursday or Good Friday services.**

In April, Rev. Cassandra is planning a Pet Blessing Service.

PASTOR OF VISITATION REPORT-

Pastor Dotty reported all of the Advent Services went well. December 18th was the start of five days of the "Hanging of the Socks" on the front lawn. 430 pairs of socks were donated and hung for the event. Excellent! Pastor Dotty held a Christmas Eve service at Hennis on December 22nd. She also presided at three funerals during the month.

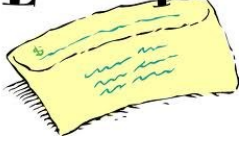

The Christmas holiday season is now behind us and hopefully it was a healthy and happy one spent with family and friends celebrating the birth of Jesus.

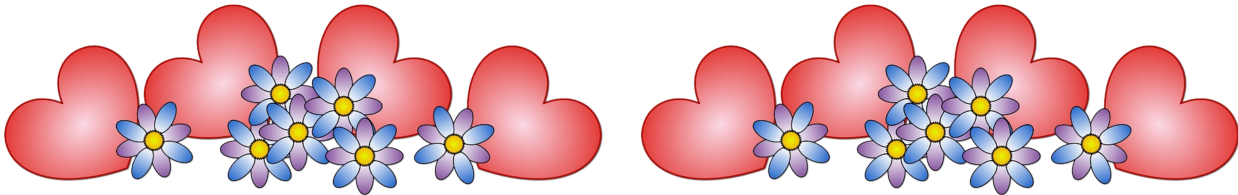

The Haitian Stations of the Cross

1. Haiti has been the victim of the 2010 earthquake, several hurricanes, colonialism, political corruption, and voodoo. Why are some countries such targets for tragedy? Does God control any of this?
2. Have you ever fought gluttony and frugality while on vacation? Can you find a way to change a vice into a virtue?
3. Where is Nadia's Christian tolerance when it comes to Pat Robertson? "Robertson had crawled out from whatever kind of bottom-dwelling theological backwater hellhole he calls his ideological home to enlighten America about the reason the earthquake happened: Haiti had made a pact with the devil and so, really, they'd brought this upon themselves."
4. Do karma and bad luck intersect? "He'll get his in the end!" How much do we influence our own outcomes?
5. Nadia admitted, "I am just as baffled and faithless as anyone else when faced with unspeakable tragedy." Theodicy: the vindication of divine goodness and providence in view of the existence of evil. A philosophical attempt to explain the existence of evil in a God-created, good world. Attempts to explain evil. Some Christian thinkers have rejected as impious any attempt to fathom God's purposes or to judge God's actions by human standards. Blames all moral and some natural evil on humanity's misuse of its free will. Where do you fall?
6. Why do we take issue with the atheist who blogged that he could not believe in a God who would inflict such suffering on so many people?
7. Where can you find Jesus in tragedy?
8. What did Nadia preach about the wedding at Cana to explain the earthquake? (God is in the middle of our human tragedy. If we weep at the humanity, God will be beside us. "This is a God who bears suffering, does not cause it." "I need to believe that God does not initiate suffering; God transforms it.") Mary saw a need and pestered her Son until he gave in.
9. Have you attended the Stations of the Cross that Belinda, Heather, and others set up at Lent? Can we set up our own stations dealing with the Israel/Palestine war?
