I rubbed my eyes, but I was awake; this was no dream. It was like the glory of the Lord Almighty filled the sky and a bright light shone down on us in that field. I was terrified and started to shake. What was happening?

Then the angel spoke and told us not to be afraid. I lifted my head a bit to take a quick peek. As the angel was talking my fear left and I started to get excited about the message. The angels said there was good news for everyone. The Messiah – the Savior we'd been waiting for was here – in Bethlehem. But it was also rather strange because the angel told us we would know it was the Savior because He would be a baby, wrapped in cloth and lying in a manger. 


