October is more than OK! It is the favorite month of the year for many people. Colors are changing, hoodies are comfortable, and many of my neighbors enjoy decorating (and undecorating) their homes in the moderate climate. Those Christmas decorations can stay put in January until the temperature warms up a bit!

In the church, October opens with a celebration of world-wide communion and closes on Halloween Eve. It is a month that recognizes the breadth of faithful followers of Christ and ends with us preparing to open our homes to ghosts, goblins, and other masked marauders who come to benevolently beg for treats while threatening "tricks" upon our homes. It is, for sure, a season that calls us to be courageous! It takes bravery to be, not only aware, but accepting of the largeness and diversity of a faith that is expressed globally. And then facing the swarm of trick-or-treaters is not for cowards! Who knows what kind of mischievousness lurks behind the thin veneer of those masks.

Fortunately, we accept the message the apostle Paul offered to his protégé Timothy: "God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline." When I am pressed for a "favorite" scripture verse, this has become my answer. There are two reasons for this. First, because I accept that it is true and even necessary for a person engaging in ministry to believe. These words have been a foundation as I have done my best to minister in a way that matters. I entered ministry hearing the struggles of colleagues who advocated the validity of all baptisms, babies, and adults, and recognized the gifts, skills, and talents of women to lead the church. Now that I am nearer to the end than the beginning, I wonder how long the struggle to overcome the prejudices of these issues we now take for granted lasted. I have worked to advocate for the LGBT community for more than two decades and I often wonder when their full acceptance will be as much of a non-issue as is recognizing the affirmation of God's involvement in the holy sacraments and believing that the value of a woman is infinite and their leadership abilities for the church should never be limited. I have inherited a sign from my daughter that says, "Speak the truth even if your voice shakes." Second, I am amazed that Paul didn't stop the sentence with "cowardice." He did not even pull out a dictionary of antonyms and write "but rather a spirit of courage (or bravery, valor, pluck, or guts)." He understands the faith required to hold together power, love, and "sōphronízō." The latter word has been a wonderment. It's only use in the New Testament is here. It has something to do with "moderation" and has been translated in various versions of the Bible as self-discipline, sound mind, good judgment, self-control, wise discretion, sobriety, and temperance (to name a few). I hear it as a call to hold power and love together, to not allow ourselves to wield the authority we might possess just because we can. And at the same time, to know that there is a power in love.

For Everything There Is A Season

Autumn is said to be the second spring when every leaf is a flower. Most of us look forward to the change of seasons. Have you ever thought about the different seasons in your spiritual life? If you examined your life right now, which spiritual season would you say you are currently experiencing? Are you in a dry season, a waiting-for-something season, a test-and-trial season, maybe a happy season? Sometimes it's difficult to recognize the season of life you're in and, more importantly, how to live through it.

1. The Dry Season

When God seems very distant, when you can't hear God's voice or feel God's presence, you're in a dry season. You may ask yourself, "If God cares about me, why don't I feel it?" The key to getting through this challenging season is to, first of all, realize you're in it and then press through it. Keep praying even if God is quiet because God is still there. God hasn't left. Sometimes the dry spell comes after you've been through difficulties or sometimes you simply get stuck in a rut. Be assured dry seasons don't last forever. The rain is coming, just keep the faith.

2. The Waiting Season

Psalm 37:7 says, "Be still in the presence of the Lord, and wait patiently for him to act." A whole lot easier said than done. The waiting season can range from mildly annoying to maddening. The Bible is filled with stories about people who have to wait on God's promises, like Abraham and Sarah for example. However, at the end of each "waiting" story we discover the wait is totally worth it. God always fulfills God's promises. David cries out in Psalm 5:3, "Each morning I bring my requests to you and wait expectantly." Hang in there, God has not forgotten you.

3. The Test and Trial Season

I know it is hard to believe that when you are in the middle of a difficult and messy time in your life that God is with you in the midst of it all. Realize that the whole world does not rest in your hands – it rests in God's hands. When you need comfort and strength to get through the tough situations, allow God to be God. God understands every temptation, every suffering, and every weakness. Fix your eyes on Jesus, not on your trial. "So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen, since what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal." 2 Corinthians 4:19.

4. The Happy Season

You just retired – life is good! You just started a new job and many doors of opportunity are opening for you. New love – you've finally found the right person to share your life. The happy season – the fun season. Is this when we say, "It's about time something good happened to me. I deserve it." Not hardly! James 5:13 says, "Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray. Is anyone happy? Let them sing songs of praise." The song goes, "If you're happy and you know it, shout AMEN!" Praise the Lord and share with others all that God has done for you.

Our spiritual seasons will shift and change the same way our earthly seasons do. Ultimately, God is in control of all the seasons and will make everything beautiful in its own time. Thanks be to God!

These will be the gifts that keep on giving. We will distribute them before Christmas, but will replenish them as needed.



So, we did a thing on Saturday (September 10th). Heather Smith and I belong to a group of community members who have formed a group to be advocates for our Latina neighbors. The name of the group is which Puentes. means "bridges". The two of us are the only ones in the group that do not speak Spanish. The others have lived and worked in Mexico or Central and Southern American countries at one point or another in their lives. They are teachers and former teachers, health care workers, and people who care about the living conditions of these people. They care that the Latinas that are here have education access to and health care. They have a Facebook page set up to inform the Latina community of activities in the schools and in Dover and New Phila. that would apply to them as they do us. You might come across this Facebook page some day. It is called "Noticias".

It seems to me that St. John's is rather in the middle of a

large population of Guatemalans. In any direction that you might walk from the church, you will find families from Mexico or Central America in the neighborhoods. We see them come get items from the Blessing Box and during the summer for FLOCK.

Last year, Heather and I volunteered one chilly Saturday morning to help with Share A Christmas sign ups. We helped by passing out number cards to the many families that came to stand outside the Flea Market on Tuscarawas Avenue. The members of our group who were signing these people up were also outside at tables using their phones as hotspots to run their laptops. Not the very best of conditions.

Puentes meets in Fourth and Faith one Sunday afternoon a month. As we were discussing this year's Share-a-Christmas, no one really wanted to be outside again. There we sat in our beautiful building with lots of room and lots of plugs and Wi-Fi. I offered the use of the building, and we chose September 10. Dan put the big yellow sign outside the building with the information as to time and date. Members of Puentes made videos in front of the building to put on the Noticias Facebook page.

When we arrived Saturday morning at 8:00, there were people lined all the way down Fourth Street and behind the building. We did not even start until 9:00. The

people kept coming and coming. Mothers, mothers and fathers, complete families came to sign up. We have estimated at this point that there were about 240 family units represented. About 50 children were entertained with coloring pages and packets of gummy fruits in the small Conference Room there. Eleven interpreters were set up at tables with their laptops to register each family. A couple of the interpreters were helping some of the people to register themselves on their phones or on the Chrome Books that Sherrel Reiger borrowed from the library. I would guess that there were over 300 people in and out of the building that Saturday. And some of them were Anglos also.

Our Fourth and Faith building is a beautiful place. It is well used by us. It has also been used for baby showers or birthday parties. On one Saturday in September, we invited the neighborhood in. Signing them up was a slow process. Some of them waited over an hour to be seen. And when we looked out at all those faces looking back at us, no one was upset at the wait. At least their faces didn't show it.

Every now and then, I would wander around the building to see what was happening. Shy smiles greeted me from many of the women. I had delightful conversations with the children. Most impressive to me was the interpreters at the tables helping the families sign up for Share-a-Christmas. Professionally and patiently, these

people helped the families. As people walked in the door they were given a number and asked to write down their name and phone number. I had to chuckle to myself as some of them had to look on their phone to get the phone number. I remember having to do that early on. Now I sometimes have to think for just a moment when asked for my phone number. We don't call ourselves. That Saturday was a day of fun and learning

The early prophets and Jesus taught us to welcome the stranger. I know that sometimes that is difficult to do. We don't understand their language. We don't understand their way of living. We form opinions of them without knowing them for sure. I bet they form opinions of us also. But I have learned that a smile goes a long way with people. No, I don't speak Spanish. But "Hola" and a smile is a good way to start. I feel as if we opened the doors to people that may not have ever walked into that building. Now they know it is a safe place. I think if I suddenly had to move to Mexico or Guatemala or Honduras or Spain or anywhere, I surely would appreciate a smile and a "Hello" also.

So...as Sherrel said in an email to all of us, "It was an unbelievably busy morning but very productive! We all walked away feeling good about how many families we were able to help. We are certainly a well-oiled machine powered by LOVE! We certainly built and reinforced some Puentes yesterday."

Search Committee Update

We completed the church profile for St. John's a couple months ago and have been working with the UCC Living Water Association to review minister profiles.

It's a different landscape than we have experienced in the past. We're experiencing a scenario similar to what many employers encounter today – very few quality candidates. To date we have received 6 profiles from prospective candidates. We had a Zoom interview with one candidate and have chosen not to pursue him further.

We have expanded our search process beyond the UCC resources with advertising in various Christian publications and spreading the word among the community. We are committed to being patient and seeking the minister who will best meet the needs of St. John's.

Meanwhile, Rev. Jackson has agreed to continue in his Interim Senior Minister role as we continue the search process. Stay tuned for further updates.
