Bags of Christmas goodies were delivered to all our residents of extended care facilities and home-bound members. And, of course, everybody still gets a birthday card!

In the Adult Sunday School Class, Pastor Jeff urged us to pick one word that we would focus on for the new year. I chose the word, “PIVOT.” There are so many external changes that I have no control over, but I can change my attitude and approach things from a new perspective. As this new year begins, may our compassion be aroused as we change our hearts within us, so that we can share God’s love in this ever-changing world.

Aw, February. Month of Valentines and chocolate candy and love. And love.

I am leaving in the morning for my annual trip to work with the Good Samaritans of Green Valley, Arizona. Most are members of The Good Shepherd UCC. Their mission is to go out into the Sonoran Desert to search for migrant crossers of the southern border and offer them medical aid and water and food. These people also make water drops along migrant trails, blanket drops in the winter and clean up "busura" or trash left in the desert. This could be paper wrappers, cans, water bottles or personal belongings.

I know for sure that we will be going across the border into Mexico to help pass out Bean-

ie Babies (that many of you so generously donated to me) to the children waiting to cross the border legally. The children who have nothing of their own.

We will also go help "plant" crosses at the sites where remains have been found in the desert. We will listen and learn from speakers about the desert and those ones who try to cross. We will learn of their struggles. We will learn of those who try to stop the crossers. We will learn...

Amazingly enough, the Sunday school lesson for the big kids this past Sunday was about the Alpine Angels of Grace in France. Many migrants on another continent are also trying to cross other borders. This one is steeper and sharper and colder and snowier. "Many of them perish in their quest to make it from Italy into France. All are wary of encountering hostile border patrols intent on repelling their movement," says the lesson. But like the crossers in our Sonoran Desert, the crossers in the Alps are met by "angels" who offer hot tea, warm clothing, food, safe passage to shelter and offers of transportation.

Samaritans and Angels who see beyond differences of race and nationality, culture and politics. They meet in the desert and mountains and share compassion and care, humanity and hope. And love.

Our Bible teaches us again and again about love. Not love of self, but I've heard that we must learn to love ourselves before we can love others. Jesus commanded us to love others as ourselves more than once and Paul reminds us to not only think about ourselves, but to also consider those around us. Grace is defined as love freely and generously given without obligation and beyond all expectation.

The Samaritans of Green Valley and the Angels of France get grace. Where can we share grace? I would imagine that kind of love can be shared in many places in our lives.

For our youth, we ask for contributions of hot food (like soup), hot chocolate, snacks, and your prayers.

Who knows what weather January will bring? What we do know is that no matter the weather, the youth of St. John's will be on the front lawn because they are committed to this mission. What's The Destination?



Wondering where our shoeboxes ended up? Your boxes filled with toys, clothes, and other gifts went to one of three places: Jamaica, Togo, or Burundi.

Jamaica – It is the third largest island in the Caribbean. It has only two main cities which are Kingston, the capitol, and Montego Bay. Most of the population of Jamaica is of African descent. Thought of as a tropical paradise by travelers, tourism and mining are the major contributors to the economy. Christianity is the largest religion practiced in Jamaica.


Togo – It is the smallest country in West Africa covering only 22,000 square miles. This tropical sub-Saharan nation's economy depends highly on its agriculture. There are more than 40 different ethnic groups in Togo. 29% of the population is Christian, 20% is Muslim but over half of the population practices indigenous beliefs. Education is compulsory for only 6 years, but due to teacher shortages, the dropout rate is high.

Burundi – This is a landlocked country in the Great Rift Valley where the African Great Lakes and East Africa converge. It is resource poor with underdeveloped manufacturing. It is densely populated which adds to the poverty. Most people live on farms near areas of fertile volcanic soil. About 1 million people are estimated to be severely food insecure from June to September due to the lack of rain.

Mitch Albom Strikes (a Word Processor Key) Again!



St. John's UCC Church Council Meeting January 11, 2022 at 7:30pm Hybrid Meeting (In person and Zoom)

The meeting of St. John's United Church of Christ Church Council was called to order on January 11, 2022 at 7:41pm by President Dan Dummermuth. There were 17 members and 1 guest in attendance including Senior Minister, Reverend Jeffery Jackson and Pastor Dotty Hartzell.

Reverend Jeff offered an opening prayer and lit the Christ candle.

The minutes of the December 2021 meeting as emailed to council members, were approved with one spelling correction.

Dave Gingrich gave the treasurer's report. General Fund Income for December was \$45,915 and Expenses were \$24,421 resulting in a gain of \$21,494 for the month. General Fund Income year-to-date is \$305,802 with Expenses year-to-date of \$362,958 resulting in a year-to-date shortfall of \$57,156. In addition to General Fund Expenses, \$42,658 has been disbursed for the floor tile repair project, \$13,500 for scholarship awards, \$22,666 for roof repairs, \$12,960 for brickwork repairs and weather-sealing, \$281,800 for Annex renovation expenses and \$118,849 for Annex furnishings. We have received total of \$125,025 on 2020 and 2021 from the PPP Federal Stimulus Program for continuation of payroll expenses. The 2020 portion of the loan was officially forgiven during August 2021. We anticipate the 2021 PPP Loan will be forgiven as well. \$300,000 was transferred from investments to cover anticipated expenses. \$2,592 was collected for a Staff Christmas Love Gift with \$216 distributed to each staff member. Reverend Jackson abstained from receiving his portion. \$493 was collected for Advent offering with 50% each going to Friends of the Homeless and the "TUFF Bags Program." M/S/C by Rob Gump and Adam Herman to approve the treasurer's report.

SENIOR MINISTER REPORT- Rev. Jackson discussed the following topics with Council. 1) Contemporary Service-The contract with Ryan Lind for a three month consulting period has been completed. Ryan joined the meeting via Zoom. He and Mark Perry have met and have created a tentative schedule and plan of action. 2) Reviewed Christmas services. 3) Gatherings and Covid- Reverend Jeff has received guidance from the conference and the Tuscarawas County Health Department and has recommended the following due to our county remaining at High Risk Level with cases comparable to December 2020: A) Continue using masks, encouraging distancing (will mark pews) and encourage members to stay home if ill. B) Shorten the service and reduce congregational speaking and singing. 3) ONA-Open and Affirming- A letter was sent to Council signed by seven church members and Reverend Jackson requesting the formation of a Pro-Tem Committee to discern whether St. John's could become an "Open and Affirming Congregation." This process has no specific time frame; however, the most cautious and careful approach would require as long as three years to complete. With the support of Council, President Dan approved the formation of the committee. Reverend Jeff encourages any additional persons interested, to join in this process.

PASTOR OF VISITATION REPORT- Pastor Doty reported the sock and underwear project was very successful as the clothes line was filled six times and emptied quickly. Sadly, there have been eight funerals in the past few weeks. The Advent candle lighting this year was special and those who were included were appreciative of the visits and being able to participate. The current Bible study group is focusing on the "Short Stories of Jesus." Last year's February cookie distribution to nursing home staff, fire department first responders and law enforcement employees was very popular. Doty is planning to organize it again this year. She will be reaching out to bakers soon.

DIRECTOR OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION- Pastor Doty reported for Belinda Lentz. The Live Nativity was both moving and meaningful. The homeless awareness activity is planned for January 29-30th. Be sure to support this project by donating to the homeless and food and snacks for the youth. XXO kids met the first week in January. They talked about making resolutions and made a craft. The kids will be discussing the Parables and planning their service project.

BOARD REPORTS

ELDERS REPORT- Vicki Rufener reported pastor and staff appreciation will occur on a quarterly basis. The Elders are planning the upcoming special services; Scout Sunday, Palm Sunday, Easter and Ash Wednesday. There will be no Lenten meals this year due to Covid recommendations.

DEACONS REPORT- Sally McCombs and Beth Showers discussed the need for better communication with the ushers on procedures during church services.

TRUSTEES REPORT – Rob Gump said there was a \$1000 offer for the old lawn mower. M/S/C by Dave Gingrich and Adam Herman to sell the old lawn mower for \$1000. There is an issue with the fire alarm system and it is being looked in to. Doug Peterman said the Trustees will be meeting again on a regular basis. There will be a walk through soon of our annex, Fourth and Faith. They will make a list of anything that needs to be corrected by the contractors.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION- The group will be selling Walnut Creek Cheese cinnamon rolls to benefit the blessing box. The last day to order is February 6th. They will also be providing snacks and food for the youth homeless awareness activity.

COMMITTEE/TASK FORCE REPORTS

Scholarship Task Force- M/S/C by Sue Ferbrache and Beth Showers to approve the following Scholarship Committee members; Sue Ferbrache, Sally McCombs, Carol Huprich, Barb Lengler and Jen Conkle.

Transition Team- President Dan announced with the addition of Linda Marks, the eleven member Transition Team has been completed. Packets will be created and the first meeting date will be set.

Nominating Committee- President Dan has added to the ballot Nominating Committee candidates Mary Ruth Warther, Rob Gump and Dan Dummermuth. Additional nominees for Council positions can be added from the floor during the congregational meeting.

Congregational Solicitations- Church member Karen Dummermuth requested the use of the church kitchen for a date in February (TBD). The Mosaic Church youth group is in need of a kitchen to prepare soups for a fundraiser. The council approved this activity and asked that the St. John's youth be included to participate, if they desire to. The group will pay the established church member fee.

OLD BUSINESS

Fourth and Faith Building Renovation- Dave Gingrich announced January 12 would be the walk-through. There are a few delays concerning technology, due to supply issues. We still have not received the Certificate of Occupancy at this time.

NEW BUSINESS- none

ADJOURNMENT AND LORD'S PRAYER- President Dan led the Council in the Lord's Prayer and the meeting was adjourned at 8:54pm.




