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THE CARILLON

"The times have changed..."

In the 90s, there was a place that resembled a library, but they did not carry books. Instead, they had these plastic, rectangular boxes that had movies in them. You may have guessed the name of this ancient place; it was called Blockbuster. Before the days of Netflix, Hulu Plus, Google Play, or Amazon Prime Video, we would make it a Blockbuster night. Today, in 2024, on-demand

movies and TV look very different. For all you need to do is: make a couple clicks on your smart phone, tablet or TV, and you are watching the latest movie or TV series. The times have changed, technology has changed, and with it, the whole way our world enjoys entertainment.

In John 12:20-33, Jesus was bringing about change. When we take this story at face value, it sounds like the merchants and the moneychangers at the Temple had just started a business, and Jesus heroically busts this whole operation, like an undercover cop. However, this was far from the truth, for merchants and money changers had been a part of the Temple for a long time. Plus, they were not completely evil; they were providing a necessary service. Think of these merchants and money changers as an ancient convenience store. They provided sacrificial animals for purchase. Just think about it, it's a whole lot more convenient to use their services than trying to catch your own turtle doves and carry them to worship. This way, the people could purchase the animals when they arrived. Even more, the Temple did not accept money that had Caesar's face on it because it was considered idolatrous. Thus, the store would provide a currency exchange, so people could give money in the offering. With any kind of convenient store (back then or now), they make money by inflating their prices and charging extra fees for their services. Jesus was probably upset of how much the business folks were profiting from the Temple worshippers. Anyone who has bought snacks at a concession stand understands the highway robbery of price inflation.

I could just imagine angry Jesus storming into the Temple with his handmade whip. After that most dramatic moment, I bet, that ancient congregation had their own opinion about "the change." I could imagine some people were upset with Jesus messing up their worship routine. I could imagine some people would have been whispering amongst each other. Saying things like:

"But, that's the way it's always been done."

"I liked the old way."

"Why can't we return to the glory days of old? The good 'ole days of the Torah."

"I don't like this young rabbi Jesus, changing everything up."

Stations of the Cross

As stated by Dennis Bratcher..." The *Stations* of the *Cross* refers to the liturgical practice of using various events in the final hours of Jesus' life as a structure for prayer and meditation (also called the *Via Crucis* or Way of the Cross). These events encompass Jesus' journey carrying his cross from the Hall of Pilate where he was condemned to death to the site of his execution on Golgotha (Calvary).

As part of their acts of devotion, early Christian pilgrims of Jerusalem retraced the route of Jesus as he carried his cross to his death. Early pilgrimages varied considerably with different starting places and different routes. As the practice developed in the medieval period, the starting point for this journey through the streets of Jerusalem began in the ruins of the Fortress of Antonia that originally housed Pilate's Judgment Hall. It concluded at the ancient Church of the Holy Sepulcher that marks the traditional site of Golgotha and the tomb of Jesus.

By the sixteenth century, the route this pilgrimage took through Jerusalem came to be called the *Via Dolorosa*, the Way of Sorrow. Along the Way, certain points on the journey (stations) were associated with specific events recounted (or implied) in the Gospel accounts."

As travel to this area became too dangerous and as many couldn't afford the trip, The Stations of the Cross were added to many towns and eventually the stations were permanently set up in cathedrals throughout Europe and even in the coliseum in Rome.

Today, traveling The Stations of the Cross is a powerful way to contemplate and enter the mystery of Jesus' gift of himself to us. You will begin a pilgrimage of prayer and meditation centered on the journey Jesus took on His way to be crucified. A station is just a place to stop, to take time to reflect and pray.

We invite you to stop by on Good Friday from 10:00AM – 1:00PM and 3:00 PM – 7:00 PM at Fourth and Faith. Spend some time in prayer and thought and meditation as you travel the Stations of the Cross.

Jesus Meets the Women: At some of the hostages' release, families were reunited.

Jesus Falls for the Third Time: Attacks continue.

Jesus Is Stripped: Even predesignated places of shelter have been bombed.

Jesus Is Nailed to the Cross: Hostilities are ingrained in competing cultures.

Jesus Dies: Three escaping Israeli hostages carrying a white flag are shot by Israeli forces.

Jesus Is Taken Down from the Cross: Negotiations break down.

Jesus Is Buried: The extent of devastation is realized.

The Adult Contemporary Class is aware that the burial of Jesus is not the end of the story. Just as we Christians await Easter; we all await the coming of peace in the Middle East.


