Every time I worked at Starbucks; I was ever reminded of what the customers wanted. As a customer myself, I completely understand. We, as customers, want to go to a food establishment that is nice-looking and has prompt service. If we are lucky to be at a place like Starbucks, they can customize drinks at nauseam: down to putting "only 4 ice cubes," in your iced latte, or even heating your hot chocolate to "exactly 140 degrees." Sometimes, we think of the church like a fast food place with the same desire to order exactly what we want. We want the short sermon and hymns combo with a right mix of old and new hymns. We also would like a side of fellowship and hugs. Like Burger King, we sometimes want to "Have It Our Way!" Like McDonalds, we want to sit in the service and say, "I'm loving it." However, if we treat the church like our favorite drive -thru, then we are doing church all wrong. In Romans 12:3-13, the Apostle Paul gives us an example of what the church is supposed to look like. He describes the church as one community with many individuals. All the individuals have different talents and needs. But, despite everything that makes people different, they are one community, one family.

Sermon Rewind: The Seventy-Five Percent Rule

When I was growing up, my mother cooked so much Mexican food during the holiday season. My favorite was her red and green chile enchiladas. My mom would also make dishes that I did not particularly care for, like chili con carne and posole. Just because I did not like them, it did not mean that my Mom would stop making them. There were folks in the family who loved those dishes. So, when I went through the buffet line, I learned to take what I liked and what was nourishing to me and leave what was not. I did not get mad if she had other options that I did not like. In the same way, in our church services, we should take what is helpful and leave what is not. For it is no surprise that everybody will not like everything about a church service. On any given Sunday, we probably will not like something. But, we should remember, **church is not just about you, it's not just about me, church is about "we." Church is about all of us.** 

I once heard of a UCC pastor, who has a **Seventy-Five Percent Rule** at her church. She said, "When we gather together to worship on Sundays, everyone should be happy with **no more** than 75% of the church service. If we are happy more than 75% of the time, that means that one

# Days of Our Lives

Those of you who know me know that I am a soap opera fan. I have watched "*Days of Our Lives*" for over 50 years. Now, don't laugh at me! I know that it is a waste of time and that if I miss a whole week of shows, it will pick up only a few hours past the last time I watched it. Time travels slowly on a soap opera. Except for children, one week they are 6 years old and the next week they are doctors or lawyers.

But I don't watch the show because the story lines are so interesting (actually they are pretty stupid). All the characters have so many problems, that it makes my problems seem insignificant. The thing about dilemmas on soap-operas is that most of the problems could easily be solved...if only the actors would tell the truth. Of course, isn't that what all of us should do? However, instead of facing the problem head on and being honest about it, the characters try to lie their way out of the situation. Sooner or later, the situation becomes so complicated with lie upon lie that no one is quite sure where the lie stops, and the truth begins.

Deceiving each other has been going on since the time of Adam. Why does it seem so much easier to fabricate an elaborate story than to just tell the truth in the first place? Sure, it might make you look bad but not nearly as bad as you are going to look when the truth is revealed, and everyone realizes you have been lying the entire time.

Ephesians 5:25 says: "Stop lying to each other; tell the truth, for we are parts of each other and when we lie to each other we are hurting ourselves."

How many of us would hurt ourselves on purpose? Virtually, none of us. That would be ridiculous! And yet, here is Paul reminding us that when we hurt others, we are only causing harm to ourselves. And if we continue to hold grudges against anyone who sins against us, we are sinning also. Do we even recognize what we're doing? Probably not. All we are focused on is getting revenge.

I'll be honest here: recently a few people at this church said and did some things that hurt me deeply. What to do? My first thought was: "they are not going to get away with this. I'm going to make sure that everyone knows what they are really like." Then I thought, "Do I really want to make an episode of *"Days of Our Lives"* out of it. Just like in a soap opera, I was not sure if I could forgive the wrong-doers. But then again, pursuing it would only drag it out and cause more hurt feelings.

What's that old saying? **LET GO AND LET GOD**. I may enjoy watching the crazy episodes of *"Days of* Our *Lives,"* but, I know that God is in charge of the "The Days of My Life."
